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Building community through beat and rhythm

Toronto's Cedarvale Terrace harnesses the power of the drumming circle

At Toronto's Cedarvale Terrace, the power of music as both a therapeutic element and community builder is well understood. Since February, that power has been harnessed through a weekly drumming circle where residents and staff connect through ancient rhythms.

German poet and author Berthold Auerbach once said, "Music washes away from the soul the dust from everyday life," and more than 2,000 years earlier, the classical Greek philosopher Plato said, "Music and rhythm find their way into the secret places of the soul."

There are certainly benefits to be found in a drumming circle, and Cedarvale program manager Alma Lekic says the program helps "build community and offers opportunities for residents to interact with music.

"So far it's been very successful."

Cedarvale's sister homes have been invited to join the circle on occasion, and for Community Day coming up at the end of June, residents will be joined by young people who visit and volunteer at the home for a large celebration of rhythm and beat.

Lekic says on that day, the circle will "fill the gap between the generations by offering them an activity that they can engage in together."

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The drumming program was also a part of National Nursing Week in May as a means to draw closer connections between team members in the home.

The program began in early February at Cedarvale after a sister home relayed the success of its drumming program during a quarterly meeting where stories of best practices are shared.

The program was originally facilitated by an expressive arts therapist from Rhythmic by Nature, who trained program staff during the first five sessions in the home. Now program staff runs the weekly program and Lekic says the results have been exceptional.

"Residents feel that they can engage and also interact with other residents and be part of a community," says Lekic.

She adds that she recommends the program to any home looking for an interesting way to engage residents through the power of music.
